Description of a long case clock made by James Shreeve Woolmer (1789-1879)



A delightful early 19th Century English antique oak long case clock, the painted dial bearing the name of "J S Woolmer, Reepham".

The case comprises an arched hood over three-quarter columns to a moulded throat and long arched trunk door supported on a plinth base. The front is beautifully inlaid throughout with floral marquetry, green man and neoclassical urn.

The 12" dial is decorated with swans to the arch with cornucopia spandrels, arabic numerals, subsidiary seconds and date aperture.

The original four pillar 8-day movement has an hourly strike on a bell.

James Shreeve Woolmer was a clockmaker and auctioneer who spent most of his life in Reepham, Norfolk. He was born in Yarmouth in 1789, married Marianne Hunt, fathered 9 children, and passed away on 17th November 1879. He is recorded as a "watchmaker and auctioneer" in William White's Directory of 1854 entitled "White's History, Gazetteer and Directory of Norfolk and the City of Norwich."

Many advertisements appear for auctions in the area, local ones were held in the Kings Arms or the Sun Inn, or in a field as the Kerdiston example shows. Not all auctions he led were in Reepham, others were held in Cawston and Aylsham. Woolmer's autioneering activity had diminished by the end of the 1840s.



REEPHAM.—BIRTHDAY ANNIVERSARY.—A party of friends invited Mr. Woolmer on Monday evening last (the anniversary of his birth) to congratulate him on his having completed the 80th year of his age, and still being in the full vigour of his health; presenting him also with a handsomely emboused teapot as a mark of friendship and respect. Mr. Wood officiated as chairman, supported by Mr. F. Eglington in the vice-chair, and a highly respectable company of gentlemen of the town. The complimentary speeches delivered on the occasion were acknowledged by Mr. Woolmer with an emotion he could not suppress at so Woolmer with an emotion he could not suppress at so unexpected and flattering a demonstration of regard.

A memory from Harry Hawes

"Mr. Woolmer wore a tall hat and black frock coat. Every night at about four o'clock you could see him on his way to the church to wind up the clock. One of the weights was made of iron the other was made of lead. Each was suspended on 15 or 16 feet of rope. They each worked up and down a long box. One day the ratchet of one of the weights got out of repair. The crank knocked the poor old man and hurt him.

My mother with my help did the clock winding for a few months. I remember seeing one of the brass weights the date 1760."



Mrs. Marianne Woolmer

By 1845 Whites Directory Marianne was running a 'Young Ladies Seminary' in the Market Place, according to Harry Hawes the school occupied the fishmonger's shop. Harry's mother Elizabeth had been a pupil.

"Mrs Woolmers school for girls only one well known scholar was the Writers mother Elizabeth Ann Watson now occupied by Mr. Wrights fish shop the market place."

Tracing back through the censuses it seems that this (in the 1950s) was the building now occupied by Diane's Pantry. In the early 20th century it was the premises of at least two butchers - W. J. Utting from about 1923 and before that by Richard Watts Austin.
