FASHIONABLE WEDDING AT REEPHAM. It is nearly half century since what is generally known as a fashionable wedding took place in little town of Reepham. The spell was broken when was solemnised the marriage of Miss Agnes St. Clair Bruce Bruce with Mr. Francis Richard Samuel Bircham.

The event created great interest in the neighbourhood, and the townsfolk, to show their goodwill towards the bride and bridegroom, bedecked their houses with flags and other decorative devices. Above the road leading to the church hung festoons, and at various points triumphal arches had been erected, upon which were lettered the following good wishes:- "Long life and happiness", "Good luck to them," Bright and happy may their future be." Over the entrance to the churchyard appeared the words "Health and happiness to the bride and bridegroom." The path leading to the porch was covered with a red carpet strewn with primroses.

Long before 12.15, the hour fixed for the ceremony, the church of St. Mary - which had been charmingly decorated - was crowded with a congregation which included friends of the contracting parties from far and near.

At the church door, the bride leaning on the arm of her cousin, Captain Pirie, R.N., who gave her away, was met by the six bridesmaids:- Miss Bruce, Miss Wilson, Miss Howland Roberts, Miss Vulliamy. Miss Nellie Ricardo, and Miss Dorothy Bruce. The bride wore a lovely dress of white oyster satin, trimmed with velvet embroidery and silver, made by Mms. Lacey, of Bond Street, London. The bridesmaids were in white, with forget-me-not toques, the four small children wearing white hats. Each carried a lily of the valley bouquet, and wore silver buckles and buttons - presents from the bridegroom, who was supported by Mr. Oswald as best man.

The officiating clergy were Canon Wilkinson and (the Rev. B. Wilian, uncle of the bride). Before the service, the hymn. "O perfect love" was sung, and as the bride and bridegroom proceeded from the chancel steps to the altar Psalm 87 (The Deus) was chanted to Barnby in E. Before the final prayers the hymn " Now thank we all our God" was sung with heart and voice by the choir and congregation. Miss Wilkinson presided at the organ, and, while the congregation awaited the the arrival of the bridal party, played Bennett's " Barcarolle in E", the Bridal March from Wagner's Lohengrin and other pieces. Mendelssohn's Wedding March was played at the conclusion the service.

As the happy couple drove to the Old Brewery House the bells pealed out a merry chime, and the usual quietude of the town was disturbed by the booming of guns. The Market Place presented a very animated appearance, and filled with crowds of townspeople, evidently on holiday bent. After the wedding party had been photographed by Mr. Wilkinson of the Royal Arcade, Norwich, a recherche breakfast, provided by Messrs. Snelling of Rampant Horse Street, Norwich, and served under the personal direction of Mr. Arthur Snelling, was partaken of in a spacious marquee erected by Messrs. Holborn & Co. of Norwich.

In the afternoon the bride and bridegroom left the town amid a salvo of cheers, in a fine new motor car, built by the bridegroom, in which they intend touring through the country during the next few weeks. The bride's going away dress was a fawn coloured motor suit.

Gwyn, and Mr. Walter Hansell.

In the evening a servants and tradesmen's dance was held at Hackford old schoolroom.

On Monday afternoon at five o'clock a tea was given to 300 children of Reepham, Kerdistone, Hackford and Whitwell, by Mr. and Mrs. Bircham. The youngsters were afterwards amused by Professor Lindrea's performance.
