

TWO REEPHAM FUNERALS.

The death of Reepham's oldest inhabitant, Mr. Charles Timbers, occurred on Saturday. A hale and hearty veteran of 89, Mr. Timbers was a native of Reepham, and had lived in Kerdistone-cum-Reepham all his days. He was steward for Mr. Bishop on his Kerdistone estate for about 40 years, and retired about 13 years ago, his wife having pre-deceased him by 30 years. Deceased leaves three sons and two daughters. He enjoyed good health, and retained all his faculties to the last, only taking to his bed three days before his death. He was highly respected by a large circle of friends and business acquaintances. The funeral took place on Thursday, in the presence of a large congregation at Reepham St. Mary's, the Rev. R. W. Whitehouse officiating. The coffin was of English oak, and bore a brass breastplate, inscribed, "Charles Timbers died 25th March, 1922, aged 89 years," and was borne to the grave by Messrs. John Timbers, Matthew Timbers, George Timbers, and James Timbers, by the express wish of the deceased, all being distant relatives. Amidst every manifestation of sympathy the body of Mrs. Alice Woods was laid to rest in Reepham St. Mary's Cemetery on Thursday afternoon. For some time she had been in indifferent health, and although only in her 32nd year her weakened constitution failed her, and she passed peacefully away on Saturday, leaving a husband and three young children, to whom the sympathy of the whole district goes out. She will be missed by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. The service was conducted by the Rev. E. Wilton South (rector), assisted by the Rev. R. W.
